Wayne H. Perdue

Wayne H. Perdue was born on October 23, 1923 in Pottawattamie County, Iowa. He died on August 29, 1980 in Omaha, Nebraska. He attended the Grinswald, Iowa schools and graduated in 1941. He entered the military service in March 1943. He served with the 30th Infantry Division with involvement in the Battle of The Bulge, Rhineland and Central Europe. While there he earned the Silver Star, European Theater Ribbon with Three Battle Stars and other awards. He was discharged in December of 1945 as a Staff Sergeant. After discharge, he graduated from Grinnell College in 1949 with a Major in Zoology, the University of Iowa School of Physical Therapy in 1950. He began his professional career with a group of orthopedic surgeons in Omaha and later accepted the directorship of the department of physical therapy at the old Methodist Hospital. He moved to the new location and was the head of the department at the time of his death.

He was very active in the Nebraska Chapter and served as the President from 1955-1957. He held membership on several national committees and was elected to the APTA Board of Directors in 1962. He established a clinical training program at Methodist for the University of Nebraska Physical Therapy School. He was the first recipient of the Mary Ellen Sacksteder Award. Wayne was a most active member of the chapter and a major factor in the development of one of the outstanding chapters in the Association. Wayne will be remembered for his wit and humor as well as his down to earth sage advice during chapter meetings.

Wayne was married to Lorraine Ruth Hauser of Charles City, Iowa. They had three children, Kent, Christopher and Wendy. Wayne was preceded in death by son, Kent July 1979.

Wayne's contributions to the promotion and stature of the physical therapy profession in Nebraska are historic and monumental. His leadership was with intelligence, wisdom and vision. He served with the committee of clinicians which designed the curriculum for Nebraska's first physical therapy academic program.
